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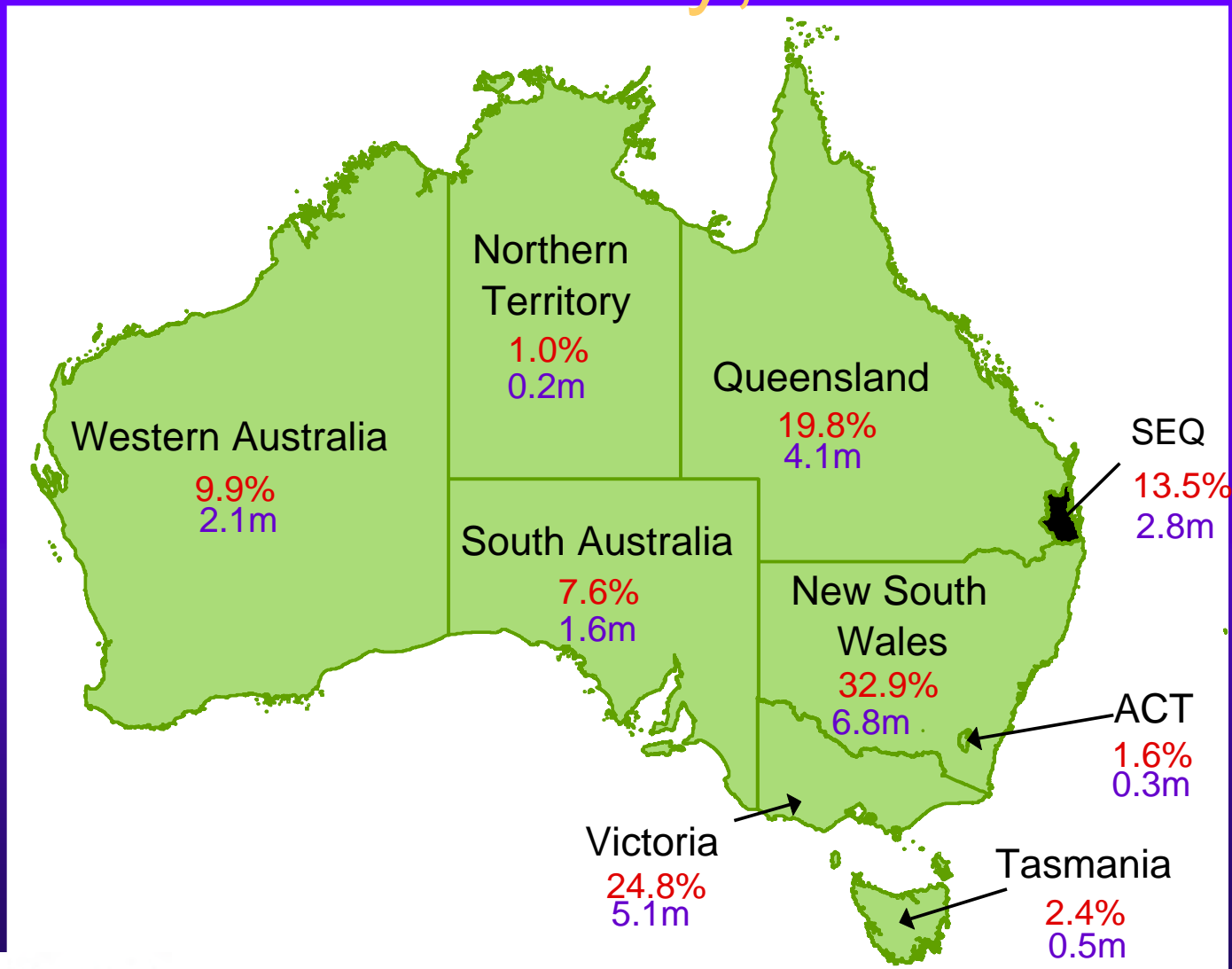

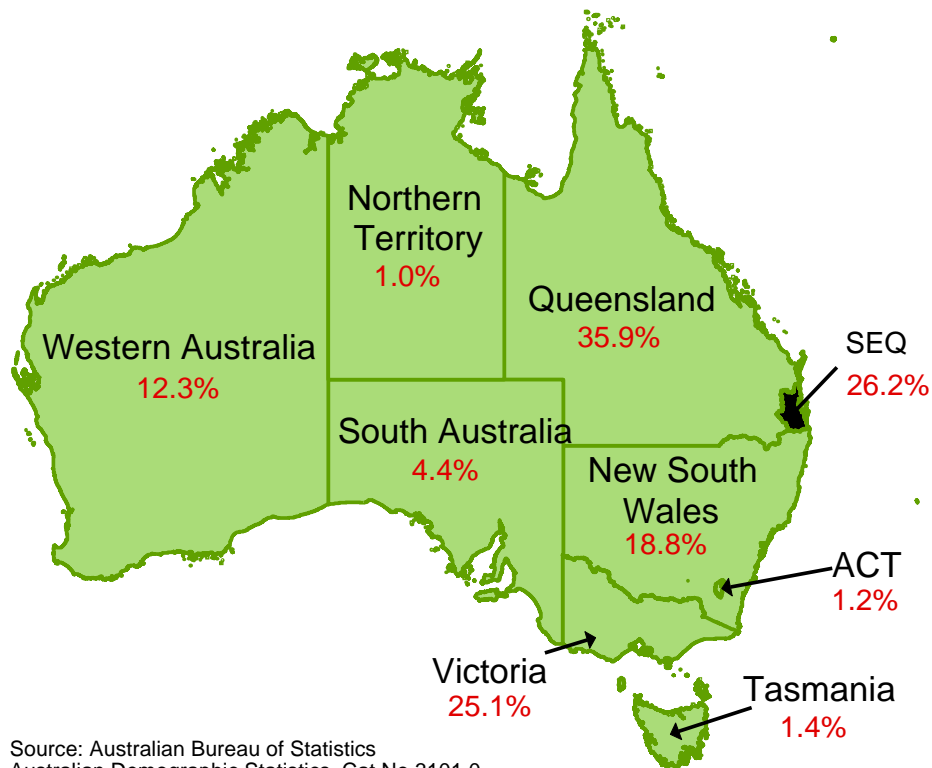

Proportion of Australia's Population, by state and territory, June 2006

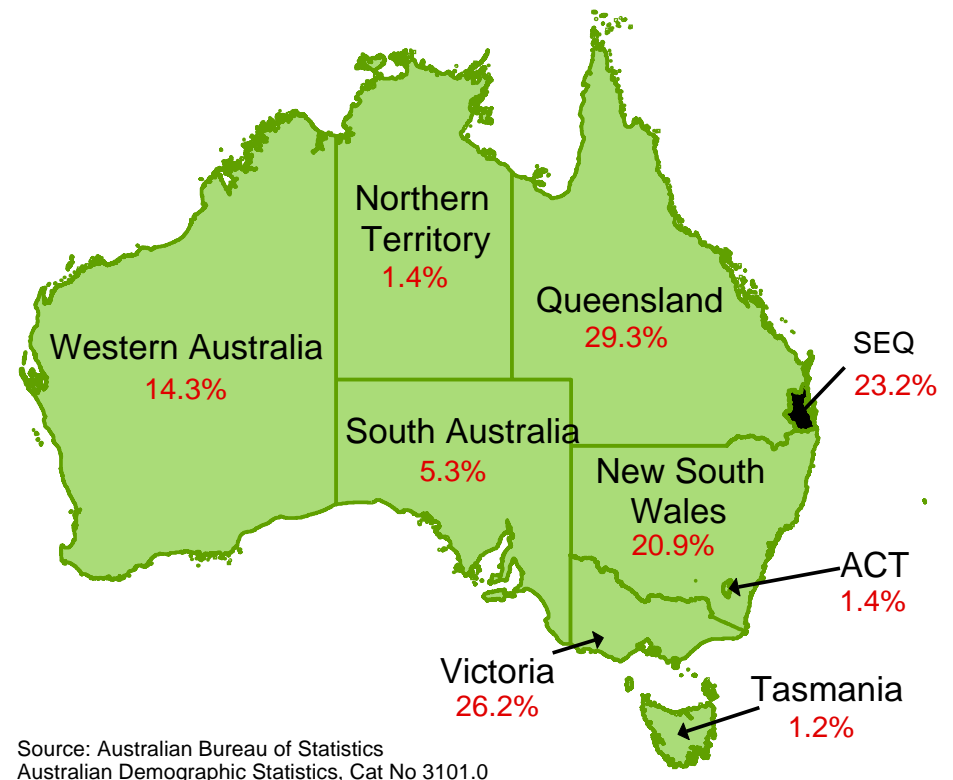

2001-2006

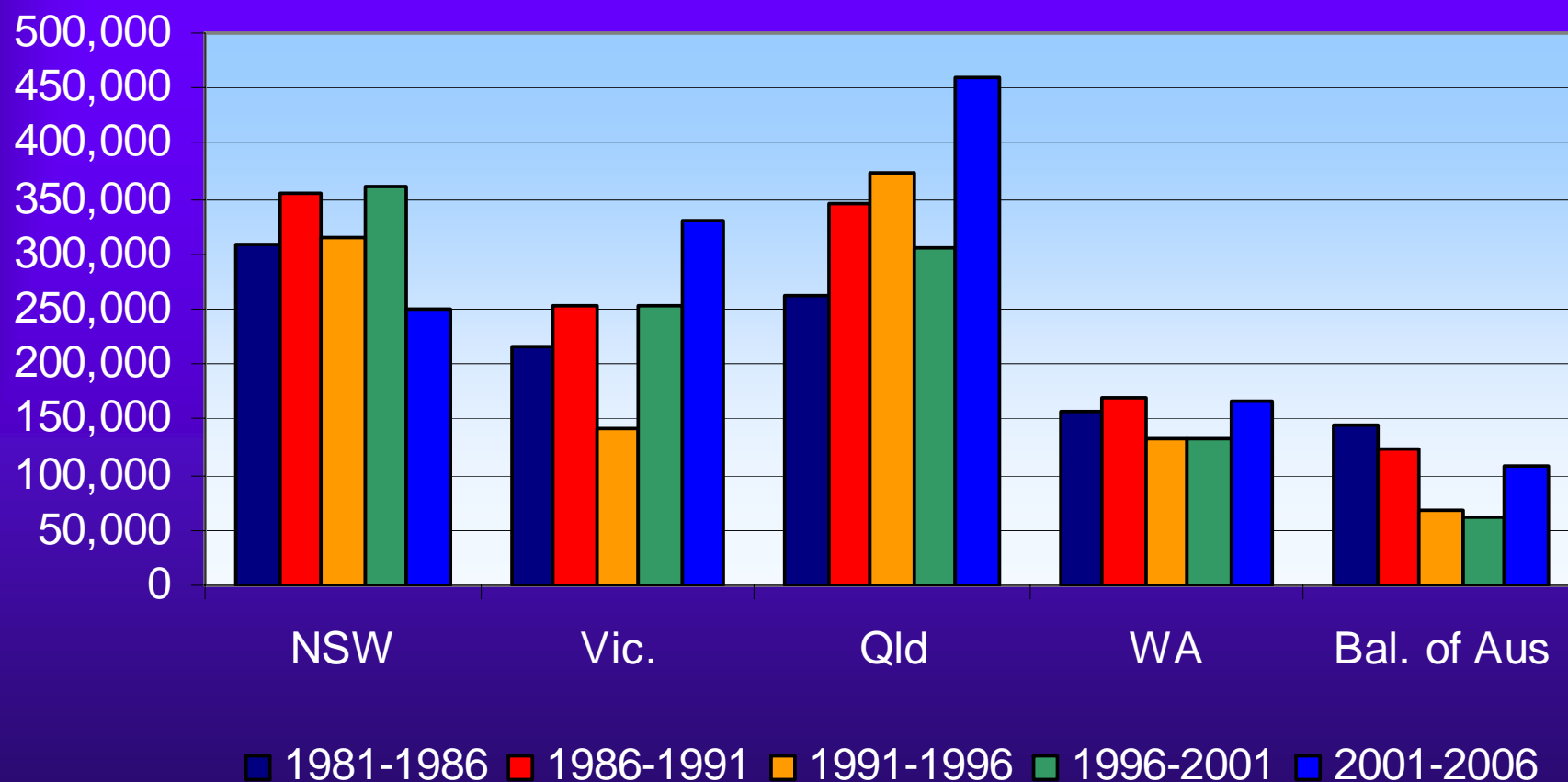

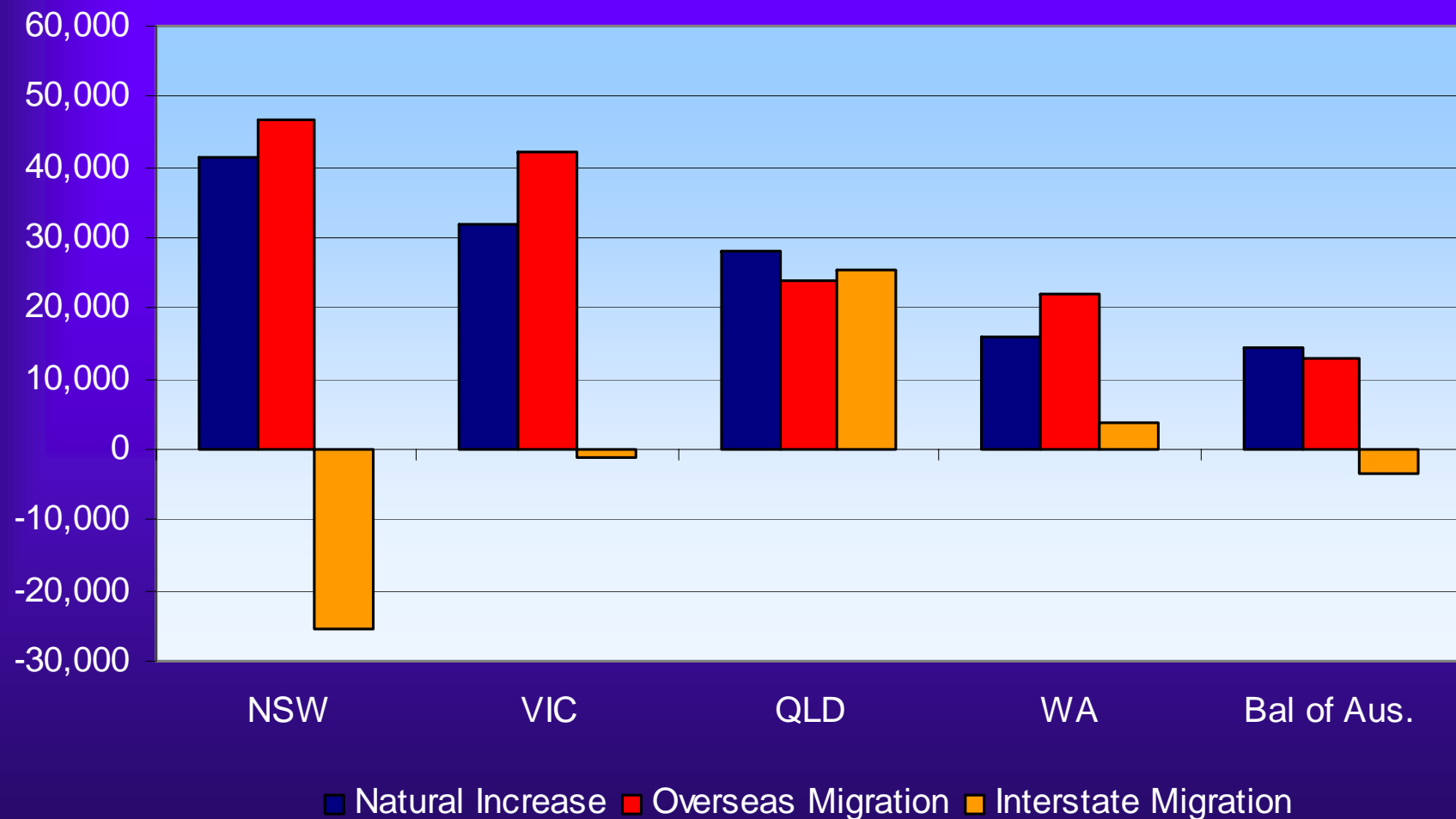
Queensland – grows more than NSW or Victoria

year ending 31st December



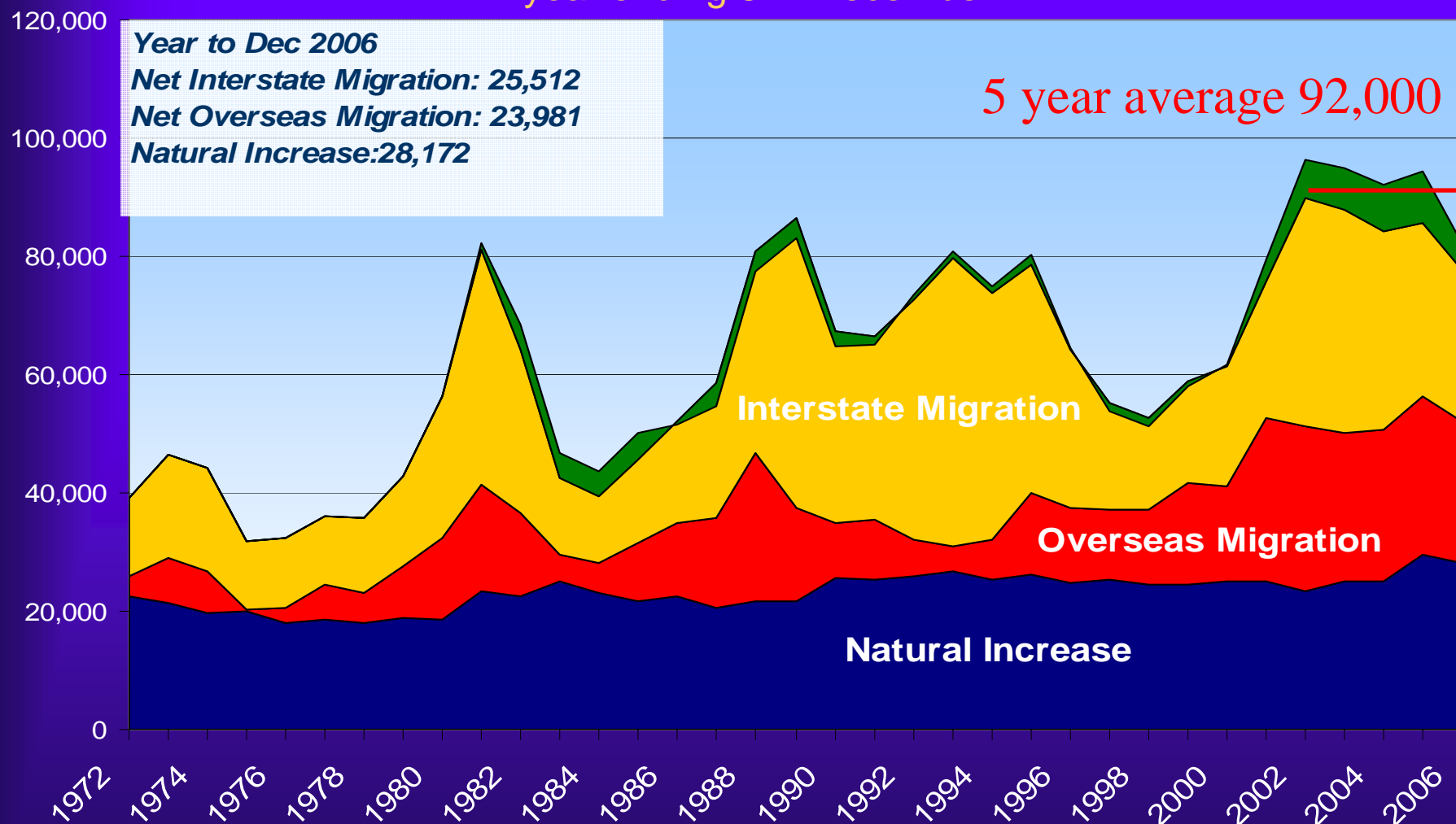
What is driving Queensland's growth?

■ Natural Increase ■ Net Overseas Migration ■ Net Interstate Migration ■ Intercensal Discrepancy

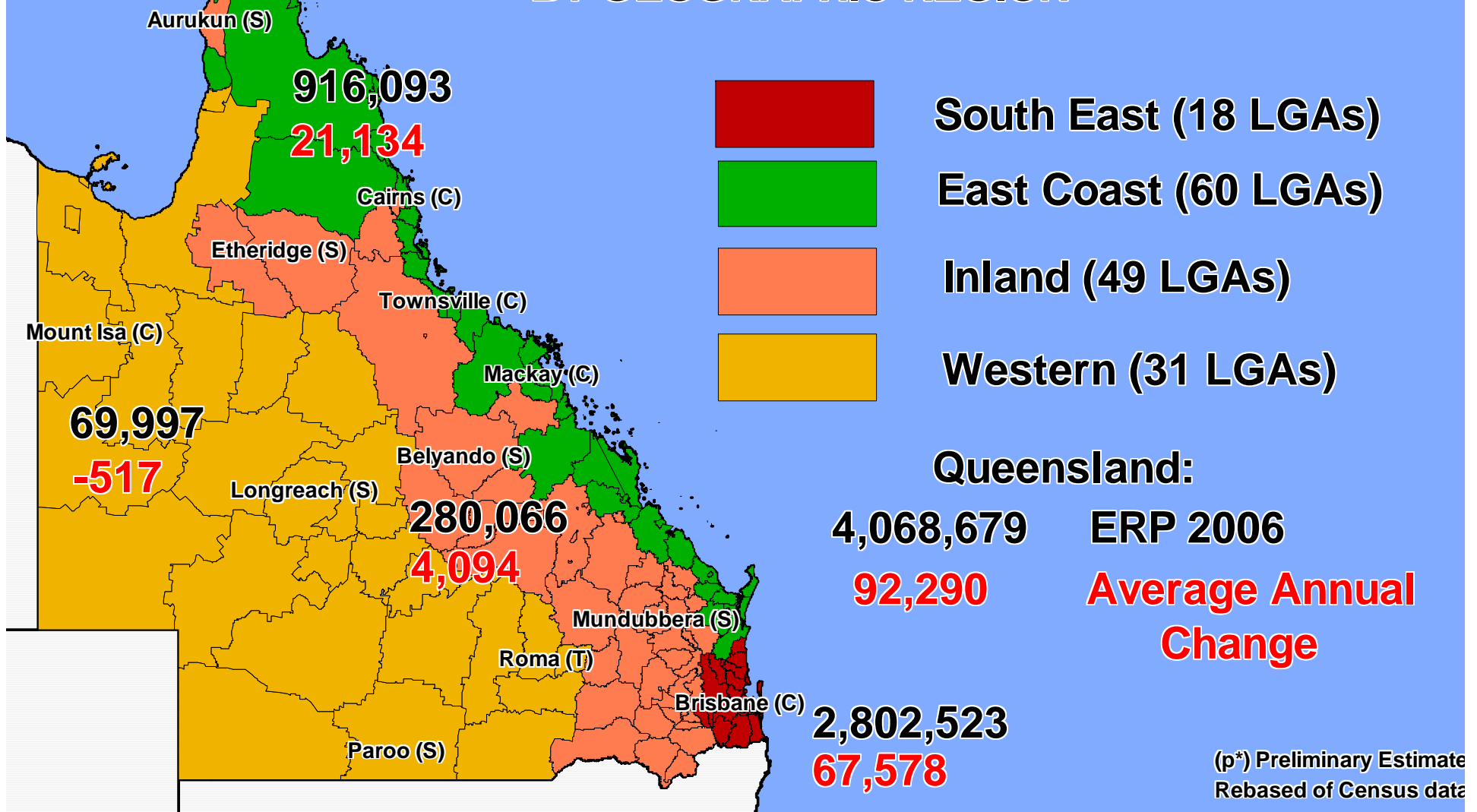


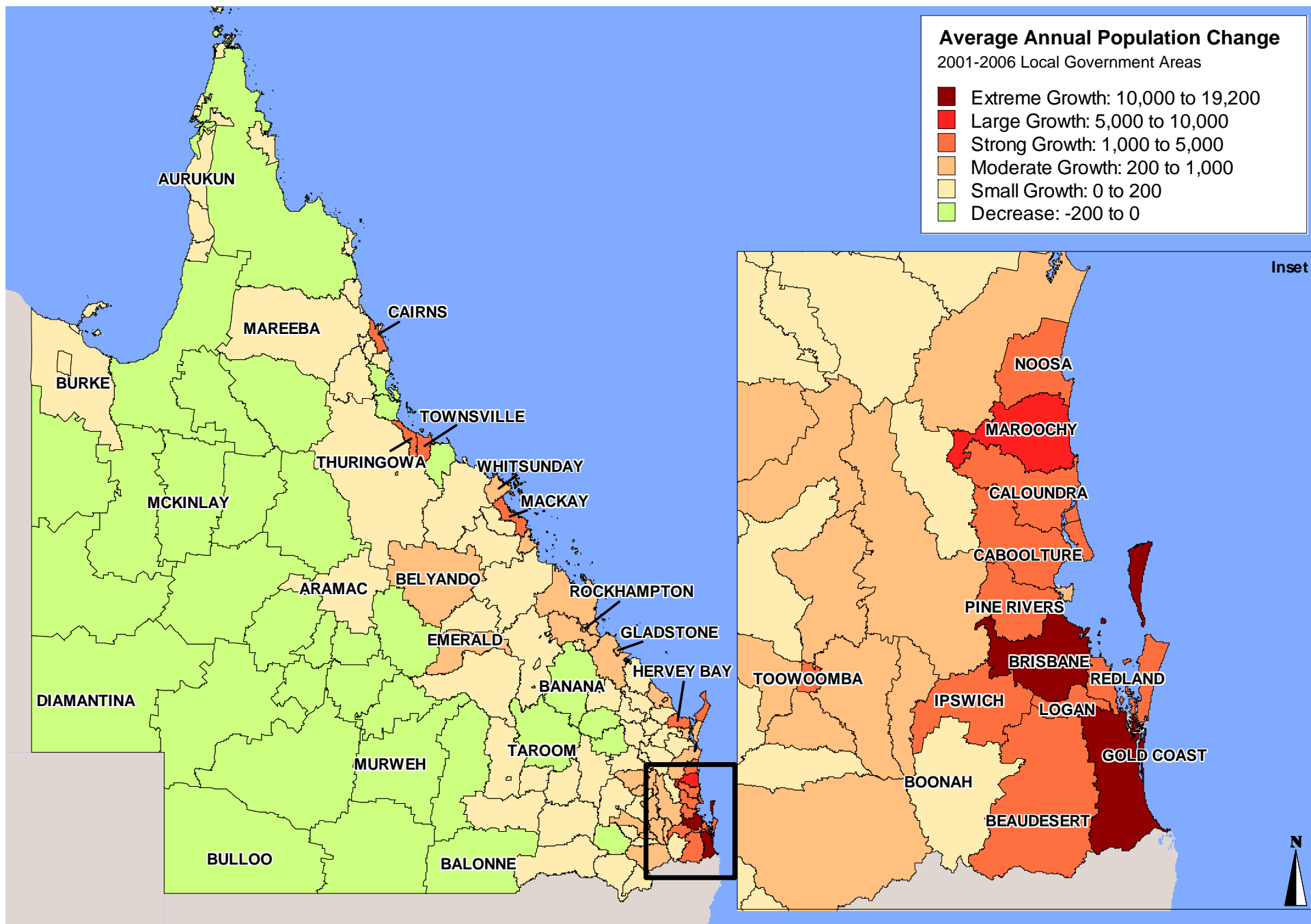

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AVERAGE ANNUAL POPULATION CHANGE 2001-2006(p*), QUEENSLAND BY GEOGRAPHIC REGION





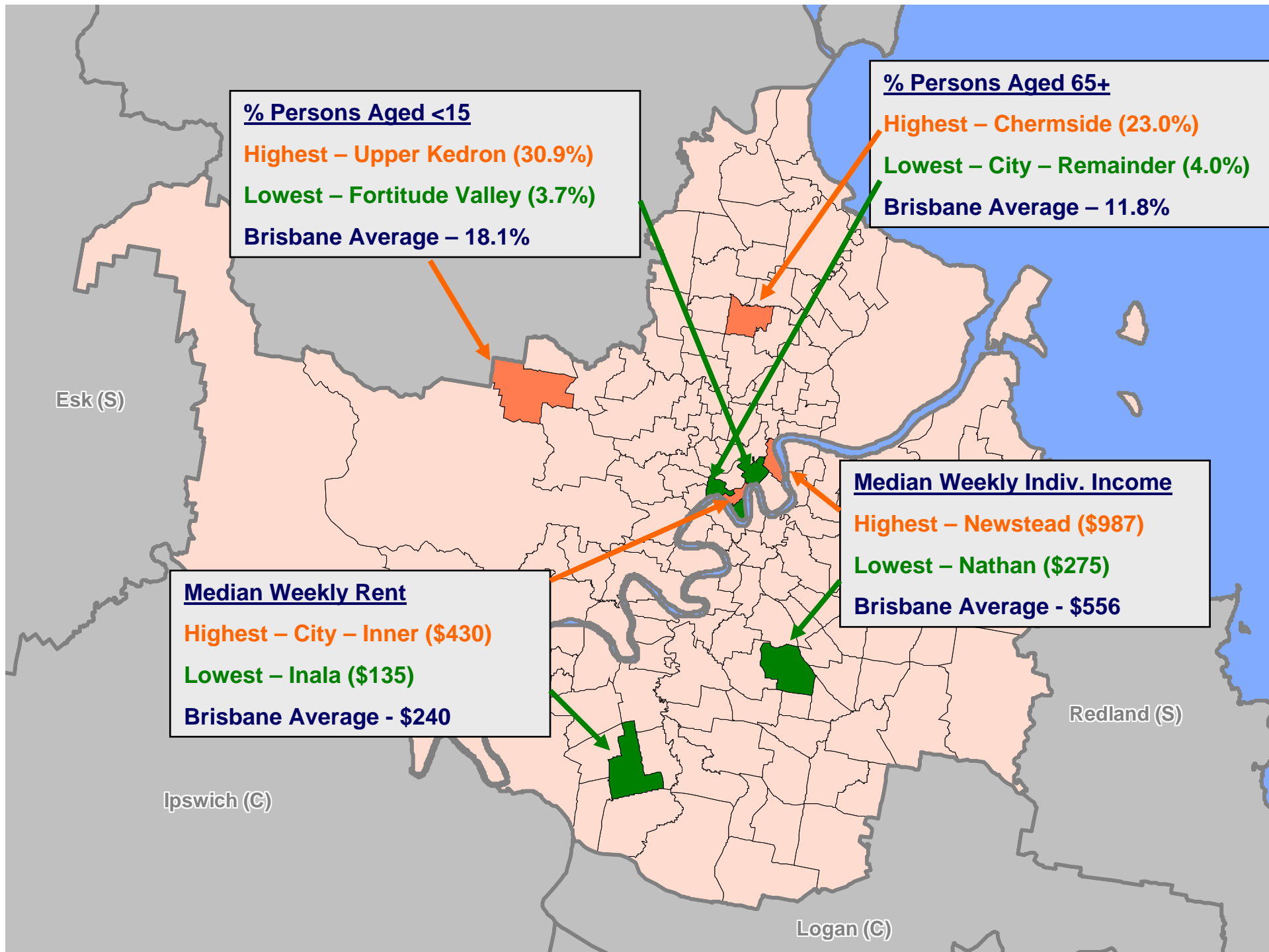

What Does It All Mean?

- ◆ Queensland's population growth was at record levels between 2001-06.
- ◆ Large variations in the characteristics of the population have important implications in planning for the provision of goods, services and infrastructure.
- ◆ Eg. Persons aged 65 years and over – Brisbane
– Chermside 23.0%, City Remainder 4.0%
- ◆ Census is often the only reliable source for socio-demographic data at the small area level.

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
