










INCOME INEQUALITY (GINI COEFFICIENT)*





EQUIVALISED DISPOSABLE HOUSEHOLD INCOME PER WEEK (2015-16 dollars)


CHANGING DISTRIBUTION OF DISPOSABLE HOUSEHOLD INCOME (PT 2)

- A review of the adequacy of superannuation, pension and savings products for contingent workers
- Government and business should develop and adopt ethical principles and guidelines for the use of AI, data mining and autonomous systems
- Address housing affordability
